WARRANTYTE V. YARRA GLEN.

There was a large attendance on the Warrandyte cricket ground last Saturday afternoon to witness the finish of the above match. Great interest was centred in the match, as it was Yarra Glen's only chance of having a say for first place in the Cameron Trophy, for the Warrandyte team have been playing in consistent form and holds an unbeaten record. With the scores at Warrandyte 110 and 7 for 65, and Yarra Glen 120, Yarra Glen had seemingly on paper the game won, but the uncertainties of cricket were again made manifest, for after a hard tussle Warrandyte won by a narrow margin of 7 runs, truly a meritorious performance against Yarra Glen, the only team that caused Warrandyte any anxiety. Thus Warrandyte Club in its second year has won the much coveted Cameron trophy without a defeat.

The not out Warrandyte batsmen, Topping (7) and Hodgson (0), resumed their innings. It was hoped that these players would substantially increase the score from 65, but Hodgson facing A. Hubbard's first over was clean bowled for 4. Soper then joined Topping, the two playing merrily until Soper was caught off Wilson by Richardson for 9—8 for 84. Livy took the vacant crease, and in the same over, in attempting a short run, Topping failed to regain his crease, and the innings closed for 84 runs; Topping making 15 by steady and cautious play, giving only one chance to Cary in the first over.

With only 75 runs to win, Yarra Glen commenced on what seemed for nearly all an easy task. Cary and Wilson faced the bowling of Till and Livy, and play was very cautious, the first 4 overs producing only 3 runs, with three maidens. After three more

overs had been played, Hodgson replaced Till. Runs then came more merrily, Hodgson's first over producing 8 runs. Livy in the meantime was keeping a splendid length, checking runs. When Cary had made 16 he hit one up from Livy, and was easily caught by Topping close to the wickets. 1 for 28. A. Hubbard followed, but his stay was very short, Livy clean bowling him for 3; 2 for 34. Lithgow joined Wilson, who was playing a steady and useful innings to win. In Hodgson's first over to Lithgow he secured his wicket for a duck; 3 for 39. Lunch was then partaken of, and Yarra Glen's chance seemed sure with only 36 more to make. J. Hubbard filled the vacant crease, but his stay was short, Livy bowling him after he had only made 1; 4 for 40. Richardson followed, only to be bowled by Hodgson without scoring; 5 for 41. It seemed as if a rot had set in, but Smith joining Wilson lived things a little until Wilson, mis hitting one off Hodgson, was caught in the slips by Livy; 6 for 52. Wilson had contributed 24 runs without giving a chance. Yarra Glen's back was here considered broken, and fresh energy was inspired into the two left-hand bowlers, while the field were extremely on the alert. Bickerton joined Smith, but after adding 3 runs to the score he was bowled by Hodgson; 7 for 55. Morris followed and with his partner made the game a little interesting and exciting, Morris playing merrily, hitting two away for three in succession. Till replaced Hodgson, who had taken 4 wickets for 26. Morris was then caught by Till off Livy for 9; 8 for 66. Marshall, the last man (Livy being absent, although anxiously awaited), was then clean bowled by Till for 1, and the innings closed for 67 runs—8 short of the required number to win.

STOTT AND HOARE'S BUSINESS COLLEGE.

In the twenty-first annual report of Stott and Hoare's Business College, a copy of which is before us, we notice a good photo of the J. H. Stirling (son of Mr. J. H. Stirling, Greenborough), who passed the Law Courts Shortland Examination, Melbourne, on Saturday, 6th October, 1905, as the first presentation and has been admitted to practice in the Supreme Court of Victoria. Mr. Stirling went direct from Stott and Hoare's Business College to the Law Department. He now fills the position of Shortland writer and Examination list of Government House.

From the report in question we also learn that the following students of the college have passed their examinations:
At the First University Commercial Examination, one student carried every thing before them on other Business College appearing to compete with them a while at the one now proceeding our students out-number all others.

The teaching of the Japanese language has been appreciated by quite a number of students.

At the Law Courts Examination, our students again succeeded in obtaining the majority of passes.

At the Federal Public Service Shortland and Typewriting Examination, held in Melbourne in May, Miss Grant, one of our students, was the only successful competitor from Victoria, easily beating all others.

At the Railway Department Examination, held in November, five of our students entered; the five passed, and the whole five were engaged by the Department. Here, again, no other Business College has apparently obtained any passes.

At the Telephone Attendance Examination, held in June, another of our students, Miss French, came sixth out of 207 who were successful in passing, and had her name recorded for employment.

At the Examination of the Incorporated Phonographic Society, held in Melbourne in June, out of 66 successful candidates 50 were our students, thus completely outnumbering all other candidates.

At the Institute of Accountants Examination, in October, nine out of twelve of the candidates sent up by us passed. Only two passes from all other Business Colleges were obtained.

At the Federal Institute of Accountants Examination, we obtained two passes, and at the Examination of the Society of Auditors and Accountants (England), one pass.

UNIVERSITY COMMERCIAL EXAMINATION.
We secured all the shortland and all the typewriting passes, and nearly all the bookkeeping. Every one of the geography students passed and obtained distinction.

A notable success was obtained this week, just before the Report was printed, by Miss Sandford, the Daughter of the Shortland Department, who was the only candidate entered for the University Senior Commercial Examination. This young lady, who is a daughter of the Rev. Mr. Sandford, Church of England clergyman at Fort Melbourne, passed at 150 words per minute at the University.

In July we sent a team of footballers to Sydney. The newspaper report of their visit to Sydney was as follows:—

"Stott and Hoare's Business College played the second match of their Sydney tour against the N.S.W. branch on Wednesday last week. The Sydney boys were much better represented than in the first match, and a much closer game was witnessed by a fair crowd at the Sydney Cricket Ground. Sydney led at quarter-time by 10 points, but Melbourne went away in the second quarter, and were never afterwards headed, the final scores being:—

Melbourne 8 g., 16 b.; 57 points.
Sydney ... 5 g., 7 b.; 57 points.

"The final game of the tour was played against a combined team from the Young Australian Association in Sydney. The Young Australian Association consists of twelve junior clubs, and is a most enterprising and useful branch of the N.S.W. Football League. The Association team played a fine game, and at three-quarter time led by 33 points to 21, but Melbourne played up in the final term, and kicked 20 points to 8. The Young Australians were not as fully represented as their real strength allowed, as the game was played on a Friday, and a number of the players were detained in business; but the match served to show that the youth of the mother State has certainly taken up the national game in earnest.

"The Melbourne visitors have been most cordially received by the students of the N.S.W. branch of the College. Last Saturday a most successful concert was held at the Masonic Hall in their honour. On Thursday last the visitors were entertained at a harbour picnic. Their return to Victoria by the s.s. 'Kyarra,' which reaches Melbourne tomorrow.

It was too late in the season for a team of Sydney footballers to come to Melbourne, but the College there sent over a team of cricketers this season. They played a test match on the Bickerton Cricket Ground, but this ground had to be used for the purpose of
