HARRY HUDSON REMEMBERS . . .

When local cricket was one hundred years old

December 1955 was one of those meteorological phenomena which occur in Victoria from time to time.

Rain set in early, causing soggy ground, mud and the inevitable gloomy Christmas.

Warrandyte Cricket Club's centenary was to have been celebrated during that month and there was a Scouts' World Jamboree in progress at Wonga Park, Both were washed out—literally.

Bill Betton (a councillor at that time) and I, visited the Wonga area in an endeavour to interest the visitors in the cricket club's long-planned celebrations. But duck-boards, mud and saturated tents — and a drowning tragedy — made our visit one of despondency.

Arrangements made many months before included a picnic cricket match between a Victorian eleven and eighteen Warrandyte players at the Recreation Reserve.

Enthusiasm ran high throughout the community, but postponement followed postponement. Instead of being held in December the match was pushed into January, 1956.

Fortunately, the Sunday finally chosen was one of the outstanding days during this period, with a clear blue sky without wind, sunshine drawing forth a magnificent perfume from the gum trees around the "Rec". So it was on — the first good day for six weeks or more.

It had been hoped that the State Governor, the late Sir Dallas Brooks, would be the club's guest. But protocol at that time, regarding Sunday sport, forced him to reluctantly decline.

An old Cobb & Co coach was acquired for the occasion to transport the visiting players from the Grand Hotel.

The coach was towed from Melbourne by a motor truck and took longer to make the journey than in the days of the gold rush. "Heavy Saturday traffic" was blamed, but the coach and its attendants stopped at every hostelry along the way — and they weren't watering the horses!

The late Harold Sloan supplied horses, with himself as driver, for the drive to and from the hotel and the Recreation Reserve.

A marquee was set up among the trees near Anderson's Creek, where liquid refreshment was served as "guest of the president" — an old gag.

In this setting everyone enjoyed themselves to the utmost, including the visiting cricketers.

The result of the match is still in doubt, but by the end of the afternoon several of Victoria's top bowlers, after imbibing as "guests of the president", found themselves dropping the ball at their feet, to the great amusement of all.

What a picnic!

That Sunday afternoon passed into a glorious evening, never to be forgotten. Summer perfumes lingered into the night. Then down came the rain again, for the beginning of another miserable and dreary week.

But that one day of the year will be remembered by many, even by those who have passed on.
