Only two boilers had been erected, and the other two are still in process of erection, the whole dealy having taken place owing to the interminable troubles arising out of the coal snepty difficulties, making it impossible to obtain bricks, cement, and from castings Further, as electric supply undertakings have been precluded by legislation from making any additions to their generating plant without the sanction of the Electricity Commissioners, nearly a year had been lost in obtaining the desired permission to order a second frequency-changer, to enable stopply to be used, owing to questions of control having orisen between the Electricity Commission and the Railway Commissioners, In consequence of this delay a third frequency changer is now necessary, and the company is doing its best to obtain permission to purchase it. 
